

On **February 9**, a special election will be held for an Emergency Medical Services (EMS) levy. Voters will be asked if they support a 'yes' vote for a permanent EMS levy.

#### Why are we voting on this levy now?

The current EMS levy will expire on December 31, 2016. The replacement levy will take effect on January 1, 2017.

# How much is the levy?

The replacement levy rate is the same as the current EMS levy at 25 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. A house valued at \$200,000 will pay \$50 a year in property taxes.

# What is the levy for?

The levy is for the operation of Medic One ambulance services including staff, ambulances, supplies, and facilities in Upper Kittitas County. User fees pay for less than half of the cost to operate the ambulance service; the rest is covered by the EMS levy.

### What is a permanent levy?

A permanent levy is just as it sounds - it's a permanent capability to levy up to 25 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation during the hospital district's annual budget process. This removes funding uncertainty and provides stability in operations.

# **2016 EMS Levy**

What EMS services are provided by the hospital district?

The hospital district provides one full-time ambulance staffed 24 hours a day and a second ambulance staffed 12 hours a day. Both are staffed with a paramedic and an EMT.

Do residents pay less for ambulance services? Residents pay about \$150 less for Medic One services than non-residents because of the property taxes they pay.
