

Regular Meeting: Call to order made by Commissioner Rogalski at 6:30 p.m.

Commissioners: Floyd Rogalski, Hartwig Vatheuer, Fred Benjamin, Kevin Nicholson.

Approval of Agenda:

Action: A motion to approve the agenda was made by Commissioner Nicholson and seconded by Commissioner Vatheuer. Motion carried.

Approval of Minutes:

Action: A motion to approve the minutes of the January 21, 2019 Regular meeting was made by Commissioner Vatheuer and seconded by Commissioner Benjamin. Motion carried.

<u>Public Comments/Announcements/Correspondence:</u>

Operations Report:

The Commissioners reviewed the written operations report for January 2019. Geoff Scherer noted that January was a busy month. Geoff noted that he is now reporting Quality Metrics for On Scene Time and Glucose Checked for patients with stroke symptoms. He also noted that due to a tight 2019 budget that he planned to delay filling per diem training positions until later in the year. He noted that at an operation level the work with Snoqualmie Fire District is going well.

Superintendent's Report:

The Commissioners reviewed the written report for January 2019. Julie Petersen reported that Leadership (Julie, Geoff, Rhonda and Scott) met with KDF to review ambulance garage design concept and construction budget range. Leadership will meet with KDF again after reviewing commissioner's comments and recommendations.

Ancillary Report:

The Commissioners reviewed the written report for January 2019. Rhonda provided a handbook to help orient the new commissioner.

Finance Report:

The financial statements for January 2019 were reviewed by the Commissioners, including a review of actual versus budgeted revenue and expense variances. The report showed the impact to days cash on hand of two ambulance purchases and the construction of an ambulance garage.

Scott provided 2018 year-end departmental financial reports for Cle Elum Urgent Care and Cle Elum Family Medicine Clinics. 2019 financial reports for Urgent Care and Cle Elum Family Medicine Clinics will be provided quarterly.

Scott reported that District 2 was able to save \$2,900 on the 2019 insurance renewal for Directors and Officers and Employment Practices by changing insurance companies.

Action: A motion to approve the checks for January was made by Commissioner Vatheuer and seconded by Commissioner Nicholson. Motion carried.

Open Door Clinic:

Open Door volume report was reviewed by the Commissioners.

Ambulance Garage:

The commissioners reviewed the ambulance garage site plan future development options provided by KDF. The commissioners recommended that the ambulance garage be located on the corner of Pine and Davis Street with the garage entrance facing Pine Street. The commissioners also recommended that garage not be a pull through type garage with doors on the front and rear of the building.

The corner lot where the garage is being sited is currently zoned residential construction. The lot will need to be rezoned to commercial.

Action: A motion to authorize administration to work with the city to rezone the lot on the corner of Pine and Davis Street from residential to commercial was made by Commissioner Vatheurer and seconded by Commissioner Benjamin. Motion Carried.

Julie and Rhonda will communicate with architects regarding the garage orientation and roof design as proposed by Commissioner Vatheuer. They will request that KDF attend the March meeting for preliminary design discussions.

The commissioners requested that Geoff work with the city to locate the Northeast corner survey marker.

Next regular meeting date: March 18, 2019. Location to be confirmed prior to meeting.


Announcements:

Kittitas Valley Fire & Rescue and Fire District #7



Ancillary Service Operation Report:

• City of Cle Elum Revitalization Project

I am continuing to work with the City of Cle Elum and Swedish on the sidewalk renovation project that will begin in July. The City has promised that electrical work will be performed outside of patient care hours, so that the urgent care services will not be interrupted. A portion of the back fence behind the urgent care will need to be removed and landscaping rock will be changed out from river rock to basalt to match the other sidewalk landscaping in the City.

KDA is joining us tonight to present bubble diagram options for the proposed ambulance garage and an estimate of project cost and construction costs based on square footage.


Marketing Intern

KVH will be having a marketing intern from CWU in the Spring. The intern is available to assist HD#2 with redesigning a logo for the district, if that is of interest to HD#2.


KVFR and Fire District 7


With Geoff and Julie busy with other obligations, I attended the March 13 Board Meeting of Fire District 7. Highlights from last night's meeting:

- Fire District 1 contacted District 7 and asked that they consider an ILA with them instead of District 2- they declined
- District 7 approved the ILA with District 2
- District 7 and District 2 will be working with Bob Merritt to develop and promote the plan for a Regional Fire Authority
- Chief Sinclair said his priorities are an assessment of finances to ensure solid operations until a levy lid lift can be approved by voters and funds from that would not be available until May 2021, so he will be looking at a strategic financial plan year by year.
- They are planning a Joint Board Meeting in June for District 2 and 7









Concurrent Calls, YTD



Turnout Time - Dispatch to Enroute




Payor Mix by Charges

Today, if someone were to decide to climb somewhere in the Cascade Mountains, there are per-Mountains, there are perfectly mapped-out guide-books detailing the quest and the easiest routes. There are even access roads that take people to the mouth of the hike. In the 1960s and '70s people like Dunham were inventing and pioneering those routes, sometimes traveling three or five

traveling three or five times the distance and using equipment that was inefficient and inadequate by today's standards. Bulky frame packs, weaker hemp rope, heavy canned food and absorbent wool clothes vere considered the norm

were considered the norm in Dunham's early days. Mount Rainier, at 14,410 feet, is the fifth-tallest peak in the lower 48. Accord-ing to Dunham, there are routes all over Rainier, but the North Side face is noto-rously difficult

riously difficult.

The approach that

Dunham climbed is heav-Dunham climbed is heavily glacitated and riddled
with deep crevasses, which
require technical climbing
equipment such as crampons, ice axes, harnesses,
and ropes to summit.
"One of the interesting
things on something this
big is that you have to have
a pretty good idea in your

a pretty good idea in your head where you're going to go because you lose per-spective and can't really see the route," Dunham said.

the route," Dunham said.
Dunham successfully
made it to the summit but
had to turn back quickly
because a party member
was showing signs of pulmonary edema.
Dunham, who made the
newspaper after climbing Willis Wall, said his
mother's reaction to the

mother's reaction to the article was to say that she must have picked up the wrong baby at the hospital. Dunhan would go on

to pioneer first ascents in the Washington area on mountains such as the first mountains such as the first winter ascent of Liberty Bell mountain in 1972. Dunham would also at-tempt to mountaineer K2 in 1975 with an expedition

group of eight.
"I still see it in a lot of young people going outdoors," he said. "You're getting out into something that you haven't done before and then all sudbefore and then all sud-den everything opens up, and you get a real sense of freedom ... when you're traveling most places in the mountains, there's not go-ing to be anybody restrict-ing what you do." Dunham worked for the Kittitas County for 23 years as a surveyor and lives in a modest home down a dit troad on the

lives in a modest home down a dirt road on the outskirts of Kittitas. Above Dunham's front door hangs two of his old ice axes and inside photos of the people he's met on his adventures decorate his walls. While staring at one photo, Dunham said, 'Mountains are impor-"Mountains are important, but people are more important."

important.

further explain that as time has passed the thrill and excitement is still there,

further explain that as time has passed the thrill and excitement is still there, but the value of the people he meets on those trips has increased.

"Most people I hang out with today are half or more than half my age," Dunham said. Last week he belayed a 5-year-old girl and coached her to be brave enough to climb 40 feet.

Upon reflection, Dunham doesn't name his biggest accomplishments as climbing K2 or pioneering surrounding routes.

"I've done a lot," said Dunham. "But the best thing that I did was have two daughters."

Sen. Tim Sheldon, a Potlatch Democrat who cau-cuses with Republicans and has been a crucial vote for that party, said the proposal represented the best alterna-
